AI for Lawyers: Awareness to Advantage

Why This Workshop?

Artificial intelligence is not merely a new instrument within legal practice. It is a shift in the epistemology of the profession itself — in how knowledge is formed, how authority is inferred, and how judgment is exercised.

While AI does not remove complexity, it redistributes it — migrating focus toward judgement, creativity and outcome management. Yet technical confidence expressed by AI systems may not always be grounded. To steer this shift, a new discipline is needed: not of constructing answers, but of questioning them.

What Makes This Workshop Different

System, not just tools

Treats AI as a system to be understood, not merely tools to be used.

Evaluation over acceptance

Develops the ability to distinguish fluency from accuracy, plausibility from validity.

Beyond efficiency

Examines how legal work can be reorganised in an AI-enabled environment.

Amplified responsibility

Positions AI as a condition that amplifies professional responsibility, not just support.

Key Questions Addressed

- ◆ What does AI do when applied to legal work, and what does it mean to not use it?
- ◆ Why do AI outputs appear reliable even when they may not be? How to evaluate?
- ◆ Which parts of legal work can be transformed with AI tools, and how?
- ◆ How should lawyers interact with systems that produce output?
- ◆ Where does responsibility lie when output is machine-generated?
- ◆ How can legal work be structured with AI while maintaining governance and ethics?

Workshop Structure

Four stages: Understanding · Interrogation · Application · Structuring

S1

10:00–10:30 AM

Introduction

Establishes the context, intent and structure of the workshop. Participants are introduced to the core themes and the shift in thinking required. This session situates AI within a broader conceptual trajectory, tracing how the field has evolved in its understanding of intelligence.

S2

10:30 AM–12:30 PM

Generative Intelligence in Legal Practice

Introduces the use of generative systems within legal work. Participants explore how such systems produce text, structure arguments and respond to legal queries. A legal scenario is examined alongside a generated output to understand both capability and limitation.

- ✦ **Capability:** Evaluate and work critically with generative outputs in legal contexts.
- ✦ **Key Insight:** *Fluency is not accuracy, and confidence is not correctness.*

1:30–2:30 PM

Legal Intelligence Platforms in Practice

Focuses on integrated legal intelligence platforms that combine authoritative databases with generative capabilities. Participants explore how queries can be structured, outputs interpreted, and how workflows can be reorganised when such platforms are introduced.

- ✦ **Capability:** Effectively use jurisdiction-specific legal intelligence systems.
- ✦ **Key Insight:** *The value of generative systems increases when grounded in trusted legal sources.*

Applied Legal Scenarios & Case Studies

Structured, scenario-based case studies simulating real-world legal applications with AI. Case studies span corporate advisory, regulatory compliance and e-litigation. Topics include contract analysis, due diligence, risk identification and compliance monitoring. Interactive, group-based activity.

Risk, Responsibility & Closing Perspective

Concludes with a focused reflection on responsibility. Participants examine the implications of relying on systems that generate outputs without bearing consequences. The discussion centres on the limits of delegation and the role of professional accountability.

- ✦ **Capability:** Understanding of responsibility in an AI-enabled legal environment.
- ✦ **Key Insight:** *Artificial intelligence increases capability, but it also increases responsibility.*
